Lookingbill works with the National Park Service, the Forest Service and other management agencies to educate people how to be responsible stewards of natural land.



Steve Nash, an environmental journalist, is a journalism professor and expert on U.S. national parks. Nash has published science and environment pieces in newspapers throughout the U.S. His latest book investigates issues of public policy and climate change and impacts on national parks.



Peter Smallwood

Peter Smallwood, associate professor of biology, is an expert in conservation biology and science policy. He has previously served as a science advisor to the Senate Homeland Security/Government Affairs Committee and as the director of the Wildlife Conservation Society's program in Afghanistan.

He has conducted research in India on the challenges of implementing market-oriented environmental reforms in developing countries.
