Ed Ayers, history professor and president emeritus of UR, is a renowned Civil War historian. He is also a cohost for BackStory, a popular podcast about American history. His award-winning book, The Thin Light of Freedom: The Civil War and Emancipation in the Heart of America tells the story of the destruction of slavery in America after the Civil War and the political reconstruction that followed.



Julian Hayter

Julian Hayter, a leadership studies professor and historian, researches modern U.S. history, American political development, African American history and the American civil rights movement. He is the author of *The Dream is Lost: Voting Rights and the Politics of* Race in Richmond, Virginia and has contributed to national and local media outlets, including a recent 60 Minutes segment broadcast about Richmond's monuments.



**Lauranett Lee** is a visiting lecturer for the Jepson School of Leadership Studies. She is the founding curator of African American history at the Virginia Historical Society. In 2011, she worked to launch a genealogical tool called *Unknown No Longer: A Database* of Virginia Slave Names. She also consults on a variety of history projects across the commonwealth.



Nicole Maurantonio is an associate professor of rhetoric and communication studies and American studies. Maurantonio's research explores race and representation and public memory. She is currently working on a book project that explores how the Confederacy is remembered in 21st century Richmond using art, monuments, protests, books and graffiti. She also coordinates the Race & Racism at the University of Richmond Project.
